Partners include WIOA, WVSU Extension office, BridgeValley, construction trades, and New Birth Construction. Of the 11 that graduated, 5 have full time employment, and one is working part-time. CSBG funds were used to fund the program including materials, payroll, rental space, and employment supplies.
