Our state CSBG office has been short staffed for some years. They are now fully staffed and more available for our questions or concerns.

The top accomplishment for 2020 came in a package format. The infrastructure of the agency did not allow for the transition to working from home that the Pandemic created. We also found ourselves lacking in the area of proper phone utilization and in handling virtual meetings which was basically nonexistent. After much review and consultation with a variety of vendors, all of these issues were addressed and corrected. End result, we can now fully operate off premises as the entire staff is equipped with new laptops, docking stations, VPN, etc. We are also capable of working entirely from a virtual world for meetings and training should the need for this ever arise again.

Due to the unforeseen pandemic that swept the nation in 2020, EnAct and our clients were greatly impacted and the needs of our community changed. Our agency focused on emergency services, which were provided virtually by the system put into place through our State Office. We were able to provide utility and rental/mortgage assistance, using CSBG funds and funds received from the CARES Act, on a much higher level than previous years to accommodate the need caused by the pandemic.

The pandemic caused all CAAs to make adjustments to provide services. We expanded our emergency services to include rental payments. We connected with all of our participants via telephone, which was actually a faster process than meeting face to face. We also expanded our relationships with property owners, housing, and utility companies.
