Answer Last Comment

As a new Executive Director for EnAct, Inc. I have required additional input and guidance from State Stakeholders. The State CSBG office provides regular engagement, immediate responses for questions and concerns, guidance for unusual circumstances, and the monitoring necessary to provide excellence in grant supervision and reporting.

This Agency was not servicing the 4 counties outside of Kanawha effectively when I took office. EnAct developed a plan to seek a mobile office to service Clay, Boone, Putnam, and Fayette counties in addition to Kanawha. In the interim before acquiring a mobile office unit, EnAct developed a schedule for pop up events to deliver services onsite at the underserved counties. EnAct collaborated with DHHR, libraries, churches, educational entities to delineate a schedule for these counties to have EnAct presence twice a month per county. Applications were processed on location and clients in this service area were now being assisted regularly.

On November 10, 2023, a water line broke along Madison Street on Charleston's Westside and 46 miles of Mountaineer Gas' distribution system were flooded, knocking out natural gas services for more than 1,500 customers for 2 weeks and longer in some instances, leaving these customers without heat when it was quite frigid temperatures. The Executive Director of EnAct authorized the purchase and delivery of 50 Oil filled radiant heaters to persons at or below the 200% federal poverty level using CSBG funds. EnAct partnered with Lowe's and Jarrett Terrace to deliver these heaters and provide instructions in their use. There was not a specific achievement in the State LITT System to identify the achievement classification so EnAct worked with the State to determine how best to classify the achievement. The achievement settled upon was "individuals obtain or maintain utility service in their homes"

Community Action Agencies were created to fight poverty and promote self-sufficiency and independence from public programs. EnAct believes this occurs with an understanding of personal budgets, obtaining earnings that exceed the need for public program participation in a person's life, and changing the dynamic of generational poverty. EnAct is working with several institutions of higher learning as well as other collaborative partners to support persons in identifying career paths and assisting financially with their barriers to education which may consist of transportation, food, rent, utility assistance, bus passes, childcare etc. In addition, EnAct is developing a whole family approach to promote long-term familiar change, stability, and well-being for families. EnAct is currently in the process of developing Memorandums with various educational institutions and case management guidelines to achieve this strategy. This is a shift in EnAct's direction from primarily emergency services. Emergency services will always be part of community action; however, analysis of performance data indicated the majority of funding was going toward emergency services instead of assisting clients in lasting life changes that would provide self-sufficiency. The ultimate goal is to change the overall poverty statistics to achieve better outcomes and decrease the percentage of persons that fall within the low-income statistics.
